BRIGHAM YOUNG (Provo, Utah) **Dr. L.**

Douglas Smoot (right) was the featured speaker for the November meeting. His subject was: “**The Energy Crisis and Possible**

Solutions. Dr. Smoot has most impressive credentials and accomplishments.

He was born in Provo and

graduated from the BYU. He received his PhD in Chemical Engineering from the University of Washington. He founded and directed one of the world’s largest academic research centers in combustion at BYU, involving 160 faculty and students focusing on clean and efficient use of fossil fuels. The majority of his professional career has been on staff at the BYU. While there he served as Chair of the Chemical Engineering Dept. and Dean of Engineering and Technology. He has written books and many articles on combustion and related subjects. He is an internationally recognized authority in energy,




combustion and fossil fuels. His church callings include service as Bishop, Stake President and Area Authority Seventy. The subject of his message was very timely and interesting.

CANYON RIM – SUGARHOUSE (Southeast Salt Lake and Sugarhouse, Utah) The November dinner meeting featured **David Horne**, a retiree from Hill Air Force Base. As a chemical and aerospace engineer he had become an expert in the maintenance and performance of the F16 fighter plane. Because of his expertise he was sent to **Germany** where he became acquainted with **Dr. Maas**, a retired **Catholic priest**, a convert to the LDS Church and a close friend of **Pope John Paul**. David told that Dr. Maas was from Poland and had become an office bishop, which was an administrative calling in the Catholic Church and where he worked closely with the future Pope. Included in Dave’s report was the conversion story of Dr. Maas and that the Pope invited his friend to visit him at the **Vatican** where there was an attempt to return him to the church, which if he did not do so he would lose his pension. It was a very interesting talk, which the group truly enjoyed.

HARMONY (Harmony, Pennsylvania) The chapter sponsored the “**Son of Utah Pioneers/LDS Night** at the **Trenton Thunder**”. By recruiting area saints and other friends, the chapter sold 121 tickets to individuals to go see the **New York Yankees farm team**. The game selected was the one nearest **Pioneer Day**. On Friday, July 25th the group was able to watch the game and have several members participate between innings in on-field activities such as “**Dizzy Bats**,” “**Musical Chairs**,” and “**Run the bases**” before the clock run out! Area Vice President, Steve Kruman, whose sidearm pitch was a perfect strike to the Thunder’s catcher, threw an opening ceremonial pitch. To cap things off, at the top of the sixth inning, the name of the group was put up on the electronic scoreboard just as one of the group members caught a fly ball. (It seems that this was a new kind of “pioneering” activity and the chapter is encouraged to keep on innovating and keep us informed.)

JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE (Southwest Salt Lake Valley) The program for the November chapter meeting was presented by **Lee Nelson**, (below) the author of “**The Storm Testament**”

series and several other books. His subject was **Porter Rockwell** and he told several little known stories and experiences of this pioneer. Following the delivery of his message Mr. Nelson



fielded many questions from the group, which indicated a keen interest in his subject. The good attendance at the meeting removed some fears by chapter leaders that the greater travel distance to the new meeting location would restrict attendance.

LEHI (Lehi, Utah) The chapter conducts a good mix of dinner meetings and treks. A fun and unique trek was held last month as members took a “**train ride**”(below) through part of Lehi and



learned from **Carl Mellor** who the early residents were who built and lived in the oldest homes in the city (shown at top of next column).



Following the educational and fun ride the group went to the **Lehi Historical Hotel** where they had a meal and heard a presentation from **Val and Elaine Tucker** who told of their experiences as he served as mission president in Japan. They served in both Tokyo and Kobe and the presentation included a report of the two very different cities.


MAPLE MOUNTAIN (Mapleton, Utah) A wonderful dinner was had by the chapter when 68 participants joined to hear their **Middle Eastern Studies** speaker, **David Galbraith**.



(above) He told about the on-going conflict between the **Israelis and the Palestinians** and the latter-day role **Jerusalem** will play in conjunction with the second coming of the Savior. He also showed how the only solution to the Middle East conflict is a religious one. At the meeting chapter president, **L.L. Adams** presented the **Modern Pioneer Award** to **Jay M. MESA (Mesa, Arizona) On Thursday, November 13th the chapter held a successful dinner meeting and seemed to get rejuvenated with the presentation of a slate of officers and plans for treks and other activities in the coming year. MILLS (Southeast Salt Lake City, Utah) The November meeting featured **Stephen Trimble** (right), a well-known writer and photographer of western wild lands and a **Wallace Stegner** Fellow at the University of Utah. In his presentation Stephen concentrated on Wallace Stegner's life and his many books about the West. He said that Mr. Stegner wrote about virtually all of Utah's landscapes and stories in one or another of his books. Stephen's talk was well received as he used photographs and gave excerpts from some of Stegner's books. Musical numbers were enjoyed by the group as they were played on the piano by two young cousins: **Rachael and Paige Heyn**.



SALT LAKE PIONEER (Salt Lake City, Utah) The guest speaker for the November 12th meeting was **Dr. Grant Barton**, former National President of the Sons of Utah Pioneers. He gave an inspirational report about the **westward movement of the Mormon pioneers**. He has a keen interest in the westward trek of the pioneers. His talk was well received by the chapter. Joining Dr. Barton was **Clive Romney** who played his guitar and sang a program of inspirational songs about the pioneers.

SETTLEMENT CANYON (Tooele, Utah) A catered dinner and a musical program were enjoyed by chapter members and guests on November 6th. **Richard Droubay**, a composer and singer, entertained the group with some of his original numbers, some making light fun of the community. Two major projects being

conducted by the chapter are the **museum** and the **Mud Wall Monument**. The museum has attracted many visitors during the summer. The monument project has experienced some delays and will likely not be completed this year.

TAYLORSVILLE – BENNION (Taylorsville, Utah) In October a presentation was given by **Nancy Anderson**. She shared the story of how church music and hymnals progressed during the early years of church history. It was an interesting and informative report. **Rob Pettit**, who is an operations officer in the military reserves, was the November special guest. He has been to **Afghanistan** a couple of times on assignment and gave a report of experiences while there. He reported that the LDS members of the team he served with were able to hold church services and practice their religion. The Afghan citizens were very friendly with them and they felt well received. The chapter news editor gave a special **Veterans Day** salute to all veterans, past and present that have served our country. He wrote: "We would not be able to enjoy our freedoms today without the sacrifices made by the men and women of our Armed Services."

TEMPLE FORK (Logan, Utah) At the November chapter meeting **Lloyd R. Hunsaker** (shown below, at right, with Clair Theurer)





and **Rex S. Spendlove** (above, left) were recognized and received the **Modern Pioneer** awards from chapter president **Clair Theurer** (above, right). Mr. Hunsaker, who is now 100 years old, was a pioneer in converting research findings into practical applications and teaching them to farmers to help them increase production while reducing labor input. Mr. Spendlove pioneered a new method of producing serum for cell culture and opened **HyClone Laboratories** to produce and market the serum. Since 1989 the **Spendlove Research Foundation** has been doing research in plants and soils; developing less polluting vehicles and energy sources and developing specialty cell-culture media and equipment to measure biochemical components in blood, organs, and cells. Mr. Spendlove was the speaker for the evening and gave a history of HyClone, the firm he founded and explained what the firm does.

UPPER SNAKE RIVER VALLEY (Rexburg,
