

BOX ELDER (Brigham City, Utah) The chapter picked a day with good weather for their June 7th **trek to Antelope Island** (below). That was not



easy to do in June. They invited members of the new **Bear River chapter to be their guests** and all had a good experience. The timing was right for beautiful wild flowers making the scenery very special. They observed the **buffalo herd with many young calves.** They also saw numerous **pronghorn antelope**. A well qualified guide named **Michelle** conducted the tour of the Island and another guide, **Max Harward**, gave a

BRIGHAM YOUNG

(Provo. Utah) Last month the chapter honored three fourth grade students for their winning pioneer essays. Their parents and teachers were guests along with the students and all enjoyed hearing the students read their essays. At the same meeting eight high school graduating students were awarded \$1,000 scholarships. Three of the

students were from the independent high school and the rest from traditional high schools in the area. Examples of challenges these students have dealt with include time spent in detention, severe health challenges, economically deprived environments, learning disability classification, etc. All of them had demonstrated great strength in overcoming their challenges. At the meeting two of the scholarship winners shared their musical talents

Other activities of the chapter during the past month include opening the Pioneer Village for the season on May 30th and holding the **Pioneer Craft Fair** at the "Village" for the community on June 12th. Many guests, including dignitaries,

attended the fair and enjoyed the activities. The pictures below are a representation of the

HOLLADAY (Holladay, Utah) **The Adamson** family, consisting of Rob and Sharyl and their children, Zac and Sarah, presented the May program for the chapter. The theme of their

message was "In the Tops of the Mountains". Rob gave an informative talk about his art and its relationship to his family history. Rob relates his family's remembrances through his research, writing and paintings. Sharyl gave a history of her ancestors, James and Mary Laird, who crossed the plains with the Willie Hand Cart Company. Zac played the piano, Sarah played the violin and the entire family, dressed in period costumes, performed. On May 22nd chapter members participated in a trek to the Kennecott Copper Mine.

At the June meeting a chapter scholarship was awarded to Cody Joe Bollschweiler. Cody thanked the chapter and then gave tribute to his ancestors. Duane Bryner, a concert cellist, with Carolyn Losee accompanying him entertained the group. Earl Wallace concluded the meeting with stories of his ancestors, tracing them back to the Pilgrims and the witch-hunts.

HURRICANE VALLEY (Hurricane, Utah) On May 15th chapter members met at the site of the **Gould's shearing Corral** where they learned of



the history that shaped the economic future of the communities surrounding Hurricane. Victor Hall (left) was the teacher. They learned that the area was named after Sam Gould who owned the ranch at that time. Sheep were brought to Gould's mostly from Long Valley

and the **Arizona Strip**, but also from **Beaver** and other areas in Southern Utah. There were **hundreds of thousands of sheep sheared** at the corral. Hand shears were used at first but eventually generators were provided and power shears were then used. As many as 15 to 20 shearers would be working at a time. Excerpts from local newspapers printed at the time reported events about the corral such as the news from February 1910 that the corral was going to be built, news that in 1913 the Gould shearing corrals were destroyed by fire and again on March 1st 1931 the corral was burned. It was reported that the Gould shearing corral was the

world leader in output in the early days of production.

JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE (Southwest Salt Lake Valley, Utah) The chapter had a successful completion of the **pioneer essay program** for the year. Students from three different schools participated and the top three students from each school received certificates and cash awards. At the June 2nd meeting authors of the first place essays were guests, along with their parents, and the students read their essays. Each was given a medallion at that time. Recognition was given to the top place winners at awards assemblies at each school. The chapter is pleased with this program and the opportunity to be involved with school officials and parents, as well as the students. Following the student essays Larry Farnsworth and Chris Hansen entertained with Cowboy Poetry. Some of the poems recited were written by them.

MAPLE MOUNTAIN (Mapleton, Utah) The Mountain Meadow Massacre was the subject of the May meeting. Lee Nelson and Kay **Brooks** gave some very interesting and insightful stories of the events contributing to this sad event. Kay is the son of Juanita Brooks who wrote the first in-depth research report on the massacre. Lee and Kay explained that although Brigham Young had sent word to leave the travelers alone, the local leaders had acted without waiting for the return of the messenger. It was reported that John D. Lee acted under orders of the stake president and gave leadership to the siege on the camp, and with the local saints conducted the horrible deed. He was the only Mormon put on trial, executed by a firing squad at Mountain Meadows and posthumously excommunicated from the church. President David O. McKav took steps to provide some type of rectification for some of the wrongs perpetrated in the events. John D. Lee's membership in the church was posthumously reinstated. It was suggested by Kay and Lee that several important lessons were obvious from this black event in Utah history which we can use to improve our own personal lives. As a follow-up to the meeting the chapter

will take a trek to the Mountain Meadow in June.

MESA (Mesa, Arizona) The back yard of **President Lowell Heaton's** home was the location of the last gathering of the chapter for the summer. **David Merrill**, (below) a



descendant of the first settlers in the Mesa-Lehi valley, was the speaker. He spoke on three different subjects: first- remembering our ancestors, second- don't throw out the memorabilia from the past, and third- keep records and stories of your life and pass them on to your children so they can understand what influenced your life and activities. He told of incidents of his father and grandfather and how they influenced him. His father, W. Earl Merrill, published four books on the history and growth of the Mesa area. A very enjoyable musical program was presented by the Red Mountain Bluegrass Band, under the direction of Ron and Sue Bellerose (below). Those who



lingered after the meeting enjoyed another 30 minutes of stories and songs from the group.

MILLS (Southeast Salt Lake City) Elder John K. Carmack, the Executive Director of the Perpetual Education Fund, addressed the chapter in May. He introduced the PEF in Brazil which was the first client country. Nine years later there are now 12,000 participants in that country alone. He cited an example of the first

LDS dentist in **Ghana** who completed his training because of the PEF. This was a typical example of other successes he cited. All countries of **Central and South America**, **Africa and the Islands of the Pacific Ocean** are active participants; about 43 countries. Brother Carmack stated that the fund earnings have been keeping up with the applications that are granted. The program is now operating from the income of the fund only. **Total loans are now at \$80 million.** He said that he did not know how far the program will go but it will produce future leadership in the church.

MOUNT NEBO (Payson, Utah) Dr. Bruce

VanOrden (right) was the speaker at the May chapter meeting. He is a well-known BYU professor of church history and doctrine. His presentation was on W. W. Phelps. Dr. Van Orden is currently writing a book on



Brother Phelps and has gained some very interesting insights on the man. The June meeting was held in the back yard of **Chapter President George Brinkerhoff** in Spring Lake. George hosted a **Hawaiian dinner**. After dinner he presented information about the early missionary efforts in the Hawaiian Islands and about the **Hawaiian settlement of Iosepa in Skull Valley**. Iospa is the Hawaiian version of Joseph and honors Joseph F. Smith, the early Mormon missionary and church leader.

SEVIER VALLEY (Richfield, Utah) In June the chapter participated in a most interesting trek to the **Robinson Transport Museum** (below).



This museum, containing over 65 trucks, is located in a series of large metal buildings in Salina, Utah. **Art Robinson** was the founder of

the Robinson Transport Company and had such a love for the trucks he used in his business that it turned into a hobby in which he collected and restored trucks of the kind he used over the years in his work. Art has passed away but **Allen Millbury**, a retired college professor who shares Art's love for antique trucks, was host for the group and gave very interesting information about the museum. Art's hobby resulted in the creation of one of the largest truck collections in the world. **National President Dil Strasser** was a guest visitor with the chapter. Following the trek the group enjoyed a fine meal at the Richfield City Park.

TEMPLE FORK (Logan, Utah) The speaker



for the April meeting was

Fred Hunsaker (left) who
discussed the 2010 session
of the Utah Legislature. He
served in the legislature
from 1990-1997 and
from 2004 to the
present. His talk
provided basic
information about
the legislature and

then information about bills that were passed and signed by the governor. The Utah legislative session is 45 days long, the shortest of any state in the nation.

There are a few states that hold sessions year around. A group of legislatures share a page (a person who runs errands, makes copies, etc.) They also have a college student who works as an intern. Security personnel and committee secretaries are employed. There are 48 committees that meet almost every day during

the session. Mr. Hunsaker said that there are 75 full time, year around employees, and half of those are attorneys. They are non-partisan and work as auditors, financial analysts, and legislative research and council. The report was most interesting and gave the attendees a better

appreciation of what goes on at the capital during the legislative session.

UPPER SNAKE RIVER VALLEY (Rexburg, Idaho) At the April chapter meeting Harvy Jackman introduced "The Boyle Boys"- Nile, Lee and Stanley. They each gave presentations on the history of the Victor area in Teton Valley. They reported that Joe Johnson came into the Valley in 1888 and a year later brought his family there. They were soon joined by the Tonks, Drakes, Cheneys, Kersleys and others. As more people came into the valley they settled farther south in the area called Victor. This city was first called Raymond but was renamed to avoid confusion with another Idaho city. Victor was named after a mail carrier who lived there. Farming was always a major activity and special mention was made of the cheese factory that was a major industry for many years.

The presenters at the May meeting were **Roger**

spoke of the
growth of the

church in Brazil and of the challenge of retention after baptism. There are **now 28 missions in Brazil** and the **baptisms are equivalent to a stake each month**. They also reported on the hot, rainy, humid climate. A great deal of

sacrifice is required of new members. Some must travel great distances to attend church. At the May meeting President Lynn Smith presented the Modern Pioneer award to Gail Cazier (left) for his leadership on the project to photograph headstones in the local area.


