CHAPTER NEWS

BRIGHAM YOUNG (Provo, Utah) The **Provo Pioneer Village** sponsored by the chapter is experiencing a very busy time as the village is being prepared to open for the season.

Recent activities have included putting up a "loafing shed" (a lean- to with a roof and a closed-in side for animals) and completing the store. There has been a road created down the middle of the village separating the residential area from the Town Square and school. A summer opening is planned for Saturday, May 29th. The annual **Pioneer Fair** is planned for June 11th and will run from 10 a.m. to 2p.m. This has become a very popular event. Help is being solicited to serve at the village. At the May dinner meeting fourth grade students will be recognized for winning the pioneer historical essay contest and selected seniors will be presented scholarships.

CENTERVILLE (Centerville, Utah) For May the chapter enjoyed a wonderful presentation by

Robert and Roberta Moss.(left). The couple have had extensive experience serving at Martin's Cove and used power point to give a very professional and entertaining presentation. The

stories they told of the hardships experienced by those pioneers reminded the group of the heritage we all enjoy and hold dear. At the meeting a plaque was presented to **David Day** honoring him for the service he gave as chapter president for 2009. Plans for the summer trek

GROVE CITY & IDAHO FALLS (South East Idaho) The two chapters joined for a trek which was planned and conducted by trek chairman, LuDell Evans.

The trek took place Tuesday and Wednesday, May 18th and 19th. The subject emphasized was the **effect of Lake Bonneville** on the east side of **Cache Valley, Pocatello and the Snake River Area**. The group traveled the old freighting trail from Brigham City, Utah to where it crossed the Snake River at Tilden, which is now under the **American Falls Reservoir**. The Box Elder chapter gave the group a tour of the **Historical Tabernacle, the old tannery, grist mill, and woolen mill.** The mills are located on the creek which runs through the city. Different historical sites were reported on along the way. The group of 43 enjoyed singing during the trek and a good time was had by all.

HURRICANE VALLEY (Hurricane, Utah) Durward Wadsworth was in charge of the April chapter meeting. The meeting was devoted to recognizing 4th grade students who competed in the annual essay writing contest. Utah history is a part of the curriculum for these students and the chapter administers a program that requires them to select one of their ancestors at least two generations apart from themselves. They are to read the history of that ancestor and then write an essay about who the ancestor was and what she or he did in life. They are to indicate what appreciation they felt for the ancestor. This activity helps the student look at his or her heritage and begin to understand the grand history of their roots. Over the years this has been a very satisfying experience for the chapter.

There were 15 winners from around the valley. Each of these winners received \$15.00 in gold Sacagawea dollars, a bronze SUP medallion, several uncirculated Lincoln pennies and a certificate of participation. The overall winner received a plaque.

MAPLE MOUNTAIN

(Mapleton, Utah) A wonderful trek was enjoyed by more than 70 members and friends of the chapter to the **Nine Mile Canyon** (right) in April. It was reported that they had ideal weather.

Several sites were visited where numerous **glyphs and petroglyphs** (below) remain from



the **Fremont Indian culture**. Individuals on the trek reported that though they were not experts in interpreting the pictorial remnants, it appeared that someone left a map showing where to find good hunting and a trail, perhaps to show the way around some natural obstacle. **Lee Nelson**, who has lived in the area, had learned where **Butch Cassidy** and his gang had established their hideout. He took the group there and showed where the structure still had numerous stones in place. Items such as horse shoe nails and shell casings were also seen by the group. The narrative by Lee made the excursion most interesting. To add to the pleasure of the day, the





group enjoyed a great **Dutch-Oven dinner** made by **Duane Nielsen and his daughters** (above), with homemade rolls, stuffed rolled steak and all the trimmings, including cobblers and ice cream.

MILLS (Southeast Salt Lake City) At the April chapter meeting Elder Joseph Sitati and his wife Gladys were the guest speakers. Their subject was the Spread of the Church in **Africa**. Sister Sitati told of the spiritual changes in their lives since joining the church. One big change for her was the treatment of each other in the family because wives and children play a more important role in contrast to the culture of their society. Elder Sitati said that as a young couple they felt emptiness in their lives and searched several churches for answers. A chance meeting with a missionary couple brought an invitation to attend an LDS meeting. He said that on the first day he knew he was "in the right place, and the teachings were new and felt good to me." As they participated in the church new concepts were accepted such as family home evening, family prayer, food storage, and tithing. All this brought about "a new experience in the feeling of the Spirit". He said that he never needed to put the book of Mormon to the test of

prayer as he knew it was true from the very beginning. As a conclusion to his remarks he rehearsed the number of LDS members in each of the African nations.

PORTER ROCKWELL (Draper, Utah)

Chapter members and guests, including children, made a trek to the National Headquarters where they spent an unforgettable evening hosted by the chapter. Everyone was given a tour the National Headquarters and Library (below) by



National President, Dil Strasser and gain a special appreciation for this great facility, the vast resources available and the work that is accomplished there. This was followed by a great Dutch oven meal prepared and provided by Diana & Adam Diehl, Dutch oven professionals and founders of the Pioneer Heritage Company. The menu was made up of dishes that were well known to the early Utah pioneers. All the recipes were from the 19th century prior to 1847 and the meal was a delight to all. After the meal, Clive & Bonnie Romney told stories about and demonstrated many of the customs, games and dances as well as story telling enjoyed by the pioneers. This was real special treat were, Clive is the Executive Director of Utah Pioneer Heritage Arts: musician, song writer, and teacher of music at BYU. Everyone in attendance participated in the activities for an evening filled with fun and the making of new memories, and better appreciation for our pioneer ancestors. The children all had a fun time with the games and dancing, even some little tots. We were delighted to have our Dil Strasser join with us for the evening.

SALT LAKE CITY (Salt Lake City, Utah) May 6, 2010, was a red letter day for the chapter as they gathered with the friends and families of

183 scholarship recipients for the John Morton Annual Scholarship night at the Sheraton Hotel in downtown Salt Lake City. The national presidents of both the Sons of Utah pioneers and the Daughters of the Utah pioneers were present along with over 600 who enjoyed a wonderful dinner and entertainment. The entertainment was provided by a scholarship recipient from West High School. The scholarships given to further the education of these high school graduates were \$500.00 and \$1,000.00.

The highlight of the evening was to hear eight of the recipients express appreciation for the scholarships and what education means for their future life. The recipients came from Davis and Salt Lake County schools. One young man who was a drop out was given a second chance in one of the alternative schools and paid tribute to his teachers and the vision of what potential he had within himself. He became a changed person, excited about going to school. He expressed gratitude for what this scholarship will mean to him.

The Salt Lake City Chapter is the proud sponsor of the scholarship evening. The contribution of **John Morgan** and **Tim Nicholayson**, who was Master of Ceremonies, will have far reaching effects for good as our future rest in our youth and their achievements. Recognition and appreciation for their efforts were recognized by

Governor Herbert, John Huntsman and Virginia Taylor Sorenson.

SETTLEMENT CANYON (Tooele, Utah) Jerry and Joann Kirk provided the program for the May chapter meeting. They served a mission, were mission president and served as temple president and matron at the Nigerian Temple.

They had many very interesting experiences during this service and shared many of them with the group. On April 28th the chapter went on a trek to the **Wendover air base** (below). They



had lunch at one of the casinos and then toured the base. This air base was a very important facility where pilots were trained during WW II, including those who dropped the Atomic Bombs.

SEVIER VALLEY (Richfield, Utah) The chapter, with Verl Bell as committee chairman has selected and awarded prizes to the fourth grade essay contest winners. The three students who authored the top three essays were invited to read their essays at the May meeting. Essays were written by 177 students this year. Senior students from Richfield, South Sevier and Cedar Ridge high schools have been selected to receive scholarships. Tex Olsen chaired the committee and reports that one student from the Richfield and South Sevier high schools will each receive \$750.00 and one from Cedar Ridge will receive

1,000.00. The funds for the scholarships were donated by the State Bank of Southern Utah and by the Angus Belliston Foundation.

A chapter trek was recently taken to the **Hole-in-the Rock.**They found the road (left) to be a bit rough. Some members of the group camped



overnight at Forty Mile Springs. The challenges that the pioneers overcame are difficult to truly understand until you look down that crack in the rock and try to imagine what it must have been like to build the road and then drive a team down it. Carl Homes and Richard Moss hosted the trek. Another trek was to the St. George museums. The group saw examples of plants and animals that are threatening distinction and also some examples of tracks and trails left in mud that turned to stone. These were made by animals that are mostly now extinct.

TAYLORSVILLE/BENNION (Taylorsville, Utah) The guest speaker at the April meeting was Roger Matkin who shared many fascinating pictures and history of the church. He was a printer in his career and gave interesting insights about the printing of the Book of Mormon. He also told interesting experiences he had as a sitemissionary at church historic sites. He works as a volunteer docent at the Church History Museum. At the May 10th meeting the chapter awarded two \$1,000.00 scholarships. The recipients were Christiana Feima Karimu (left, below) from Taylorsville High School and Steve



Puleman Saia (right, above) from Hunter High School. The awards were presented by Jerry Davis, the Chapter Scholarship Chairman. Funds were donated by members of the chapter and are provided for students who subscribe to pioneer values and have overcome some difficulty or obstacle in their life. At the same meeting Michael and Mary Barnard portrayed Brigham and Mary Young (right). They were in costume and did a great job of acting in the first person. Mary Young told of her riding in stage coaches and other adventurous experiences. Brigham told interesting stories of his life. For the past

twenty years the Barnard's have portrayed many historical figures. They have told stories of many pioneers in the first person.

TEMPLE FORK (Logan, Utah) One Thousand dollar scholarships were awarded by the chapter to Carlotta Foitzick (below right)



and **Stratton Caputo** (above left) at the May dinner meeting. Carlotta is graduating from Sky View High School and Stratton is graduating from Logan High School. They both have achieved high academic success and of the many contestants have best met the criteria for the scholarships by (1) overcoming some disability, (2) achieving academic goals and (3) preparing

to contribute to society. Each of these recipients has been very much involved in service activities and demonstrated their desire to be involved in their communities.

The speaker for the meeting was **Newell Daines** (right). He is a retired medical doctor





and has made numerous contributions to Logan City. He was mayor of Logan City in 1982 – 1990 and has been instrumental in restoring many old buildings along Main Street. The restoration projects began in 1977 when his son, George, was setting up a law practice in Logan and purchased a building at 128 North Main. They restored it turning it into a nice office building. In 1983 – 84 the Cache Valley Bank, which Newell was associated with, purchased the Low Cost Drug building. It was remodeled to house the bank. Other restoration projects which Newel has been instrumental in saving from destruction and then being restored include the Thatcher/Young house, the Capital Theater, the old courthouse and the Wilkinson building and others. His very interesting remarks were about these restoration projects. When asked what he would like his next project to be Newell responded that it would be to have the Logan Temple annex covered with stone that matched the temple.

TEMPLE QUARRY and JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE (South Salt Lake Valley) Ivan Hill and his wife came to the meeting in costume and portrayed Ephraim Hanks (below left) and his wife, Thisbe Read (below right). They did a





fantastic job of telling the story of this couple. Brother Hanks was born in Ohio on March 21, 1826. At age 16 he left home and worked during a season on the Erie Canal until it froze over. He then served an enlistment in the U.S. Navy. Returning home to Ohio he learned that his brother, Sidney, had joined the Mormon Church. Ephraim accepted the teachings of the church and was baptized in 1845. He left Nauvoo following Brigham Young on the trek west. However along the way he joined the **Mormon** Battalion and marched with them to San Diego, California. After being mustered out of the battalion he left for the Salt Lake Valley. Brigham Young and Ephraim became good friends and had many encounters together. Brother Hill told of Ephraim's experience of receiving promptings while fishing at Utah Lake that caused him to return home and make himself ready for a call from Brigham Young to go and rescue the handcart company people. He told of not turning back when many others did and of his being blessed by the miracle of buffalo in his path when it was not the season for them to be in the area, and what a blessing it was for the members of the Martin Handcart Company to receive the meat. Ephraim gave healing blessings to many members of the company who were

sick, including a man who was thought to be dead. He gave a blessing to an eleven year old girl named Thisbe Read, who recovered and some years later became his wife. "Eph", as he was often called, was a spiritual man and in later years was ordained a patriarch. The presentation by Brother and Sister Hill was the same that they gave as volunteers last year at Martin's Cove and was most impressive and educational. They will serve again this year at the "Cove".

THE MOUNTAIN VALLEY (Heber City, Utah) The Sons and Daughters of the Utah Pioneers held their annual awards banquet on May 27th. Dick Bailey, Chairman of the Mountain Valley Chapter Awards Committee, and Judy Milliner, President of the Wasatch Camp of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers organized the program to honor a few Heber Valley

residents for their pioneering spirit. The honorees were: Stella Orgill, Gordon Holman as the Past Pioneer, Vernon L. Murdock as the Modern Day Pioneer, and Alexandra M. Jeppson as Tomorrow's Pioneer. Included

with Alexandra's award was a \$1,000 scholarship. The funds for the scholarship came from donations from chapter members and a matching grant from the **Belliston Foundation**. The chapter took a moment to honor **Homer M.**

LeBaron, one of their past presidents.


