PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Saturday, 29 September 2012, was a very important day for cleaning, trimming, pruning, pulling weeds, at the Headquarters building. It was important because it gave us the opportunity to give something back to this great organization. Many have given great effort, time and talents to the internal functioning of SUP. On this day, others were blessed to do even more. And, I missed the opportunity to do my part! I'm sorry for that. Let me tell you about this journey, a heavy duty trip over the past three weeks.

Tuesday Sept. 4, 2012, I had an accidental fall at our Centerville Chapter SUP Wagon Wheel Dinner. Landing on my chest on the wagon wheel as it fell to the ground, we thought that perhaps some ribs might have been broken. I landed in the emergency room at LDS Hospital, X rays proved that there was temporary damage to the chest, and I would be sore for a while, but upon further testing, with a CT scan, the doctor found something even more life threatening, an aortic aneurysm. First

indications were to rush me to the trauma center at IMC and have it taken care of immediately. But more tests with an ultra sound showed that we could proceed more slowly, to the operation with Dr. John Doty in the coming week. An angioplasty proved that there were no other problems, so Tuesday 18 September, I underwent open heart surgery to replace the old part of the aorta with a new section. After 7 days in the hospital, my release came on Monday evening, 24 September.

This brings us to 29 September, the big cleanup day. My wife and I did attend, briefly, but only long enough to see more than 30 brethren, hard at work on the multiple projects. We were in awe as we witnessed so many at work. Talk about elation. I have love and respect for those weary workers. We did not remain long, for obvious reasons, but long enough to glory in the mood and faithfulness of our great SUP team members who gave their all, under the expert organization of Pete Riches and Tess. You have given us new life and togetherness. Pioneers, every one of you, responding to the call! I'm sorry about not being able to work with you, for I love and respect every one of you.

Now, we move forward, working to finish the job, that of staying the course, working together in this great organization.

May God bless you all. May God bless the USA.



He also showed a more scripturally correct map of the route the children of Israel followed from Egypt across the Red Sea and then to the Promised Land shown below.

Utah Pioneers. In September
we recognized Kenneth J.
Alford and William J
Critchlow III (right).

Kenneth J. Alford was born March 4, 1930 in Ogden, Utah. He married Dolores Hawkeswood. He is a retired educator having served as principal of Central Jr. High School and Mt. Ogden Jr. High School. His church callings include serving as Bishop, Stake President, Temple sealer, and Patriarch. He served six years in the state legislature. He graduated from Ogden High School, Weber State University, Brigham Young University, and the University of Utah. He served eight years on the Ogden City Council. He and his wife served a mission in the country of Spain.

William (Bill) J. Critchlow III was born in Ogden Utah 12 December, 1929. He married Peggy Marie Wood and after her death he married Raelene Sommers Brian. He has been an attorney, a Bishop, a Director of the St. George Temple Visitors' Center, President of SUP Ogden Chapter, and National President of Sons of Utah Pioneers. His education consists of Ogden High School, Weber College, University of Utah, George Washington University, Northwestern University, and the University of California. He is the recipient of an Honorary Doctor of Humanities from Weber State University. His great-great- grandfather is Captain James Brown.

The Chapter members also had the opportunity of going on a trek to the "Ogden Temple Visitor's Center". This is a small trailer complex across 22^{nd} Street south of the Temple where we



were given a presentation on the progress of the Temple. The Temple is in the process of an extensive remodeling where the structure was taken down to the basement and part of the first floor. The picture on the next page shows the Temple as it looks today with the framework for the spire half-way up.



While no date has been given, it is anticipated that the Temple will be reopen in mid-2014 looking something like the picture below. Both of these pictures are from the internet where much information can be found on it.



SALT LAKE CITY CHAPTER (Salt Lake City, Utah) -- Last month Emily Utt spoke to us about our pioneer heritage and some of the stories that have grown to become myths. She reminded us of the importance of telling and recording our church history and family stories so that they don't become myths. I like what she said about myths. Myths teach us what we want to believe, because they have a basis of truth. But there are many wonderful stories, and true stories that can stand on their own.

Have you ever heard the story about shafts being built in the Salt Lake Temple so that in future generations when elevators were invented the shafts were there ready to have the elevators installed? Did you know however, that elevators were invented in 1853, and when the Temple was being built in 1888 large rooms on each end of the Temple, east and west, were built in preparation. The church has a record of purchasing Otis elevators to be installed in the original Temple before its dedication.

Do you remember the story about the sisters breaking up their china and pulverizing it so that it could be put into the walls of the Kirtland Temple to give beauty? Well the truth is that boys were assigned to go to the trash piles to pick out the fractured china so it could be recycled into the mortar and plaster for the Kirtland Temple.

Are you getting the flavor of the wonderful talk about myths? Once again, myths teach what we want to believe, not necessarily what is true. The stories which we pass on from generation to generation can build faith and testimony as they stand on their own and not become a myth, teaching us what we want to believe.

SEVIER VALLEY CHAPTER (Richfield,

Utah) -- August's Dinner Meeting was a presentation from **Kim Hyatt** who is a ranger at Bryce Canyon National Park he was assisted by the Acting Chief of Interpretive Services at Bryce Canyon National Park, **Kathleen Gonder**. Kim showed slides as he talked about the history of the Bryce Canyon and the unique way it was promoted nationwide by the railroad as that was the main mode of tourist transportation when the park was established. There was also some discussion of the history of the surrounding area. Bryce Canyon has a rich history of Mormon pioneer families and the pioneering of tourism here in Southern Utah.



TEMPLE FORK
CHAPTER (Logan,
Utah) -- The July speaker,
Lyle W. Hillyard (left),
is a native of Cache
Valley. Mr. Hillyard was
a Republican Member of
Utah House of
Representatives from
1981 to 1984, and a

member of Utah Senate from 1985 to present. He reported on the activities of the recent State Legislature.

He sees that there are three big problems in Utah:

- 1. Funding of growth -- Costs are going up for things like education and jails. Some individuals want to take jobs, such as teaching school, but they can't afford to do that because they have schooling debts of \$10,000 to \$15,000.
- 2. Unexpected things happen -- This year fighting fires has cost \$47 million and has to be funded. Reseeding is needed to prevent slides and flooding following wild fires. Last year Utah did early orders for seed to be used to reseed because of all the fires last year. This was very fortunate as the large number of fires has caused such a demand that seed is no longer available.

In education there were 8,000 more students than predicted, and \$25 million more was needed. The number of computers purchased has been cut back, but that cannot continue. Hillyard predicted more on-line teaching and use of technology to replace teachers as they retire.

3. Need to be more involved in the community -- National studies find that service in Utah is high, and their studies do not include Church service. People teach children to do service. Many Eagle Scout projects have helped teach this concept.



The chapter also sponsored a fireside to celebrate the 24th of July. **Bill Riggins** was the featured speaker.

Bill gave a history of his life and his conversion to the LDS Church. Even though he does not have pioneer ancestors, he is appreciative of the pioneers and the price they paid for what was in their hearts.

Today we are experiencing many trials and special challenges. According to our Church leaders, the youth today are being raised in enemy territory. He indicated our forefathers were amazing. If we take hold of the same foundations we will be just fine. Otherwise we will be blown about. When we take hold of the principles of Jesus Christ we will be as strong as the pioneers.

SUP MONUMENTS, MasterList with Pictures on DVD's including Hi-Res pictures lsr 8-16-12

There have been requests for copies of the now-published list of Monuments erected over the years by the Sons of Utah Pioneers and the Utah Pioneer Trails and Landmarks Association.

Due to the expense of print copies, only a limited number have been printed for use by the National Board and the SUP Library.

However, DVD copies can be reproduced inexpensively, and are now available to those who want them.

Monuments on DVD's are listed by geographical location with pictures and narrative explaining the historical significance of each monument, with High-Resolution pictures suitable for copying or printing. Currently there are 387 such markers listed.

Since new monuments are being created frequently, only small quantities of the DVD's are produced at a time so that the latest version of the list is always available as they are ordered. Each DVD is in a clear plastic case.

"Faith in Every Footstep" Grave Markers

In 1997, a Church committee created a marker to be attached to the graves of Pioneers who arrived in the valley prior to the coming of the railroad. These were sold to anyone who wanted to attach one to the grave of his or her ancestor, in commemoration of the sesquicentennial of the arrival of the Pioneers in 1847.

For some time the markers have not been available, and we (the SUP) have had frequent requests as to how to get them. The National office of the SUP has made arrangements to have a number of them manufactured and are making them available to members or others who wish to honor their ancestors by attaching one to his or her grave marker.


The markers are 2 ½ inches by 3 ½ inches of very durable metal. Those who attached them in 1997 say they have not deteriorated from weather.
