### NOMINATIONS FOR NATIONAL SUP PRESIDENT-ELECT 2018

### LOVINA SMITH WALKER

Lovina Smith was born on the 18th of September 1827 in Manchester, New York, just 3 days before her Uncle Joseph got the plates for the Book of Mormon. She is the oldest child of Hyrum and Jerusha Barden Smith. She was not quite 4 when the family moved to Kirtland, Ohio. Here she watched the growth of the Church and particularly the building of the Kirtland Temple.

She was barely 10 in October 1837 when her mother died. On the advice of his brother, Joseph, Hyrum married Mary Fielding. Lovina had mixed feelings about her father marrying so soon after her mother's death, but she grew to love and respect her new mother.

It was in Nauvoo where Lovina's life took some drastic changes. To begin with, she met a young man, named Lorin Walker, and in the spring of 1844 she accepted his proposal of marriage and the two made plans for a fall wedding. Then came the events of June 1844! On Saturday, June 22nd, Joseph and Hyrum crossed the Mississippi in an unsuccessful effort to forestall mob actions. This caused Lovina to make some changes to her plans for marriage; she realized that if she wanted her father to be there for her wedding, it would have to be soon.

On Sunday, June 23, Joseph and Hyrum returned from across the Mississippi; as they approached Hyrum's home, Lovina came out to meet them.

Joseph, in his loving manner, chided her; "Lovina, when are you going to get married?"

To which she replied, "Uncle Joseph, we were just waiting for you."

"Go get your beau," Joseph responded. Lovina and Lorin were married that evening with the family present. The next morning Joseph and Hyrum left for Carthage.

Joseph had asked Lorin to take care of Emma if anything happened to him, so after the martyrdom Lorin and Lovina lived in the Mansion house with Emma and when the Saints left Nauvoo, they stayed with Emma to provide help for her. They lived in the Mansion House until about 1849 when they moved to Macedonia where the Smith sisters, Catherine, Sophronia and Lucy were living.

It was there where Lorin's brother William found them in the spring of 1856. While Lorin and Lovina had wanted to travel west to be with the Saints, they had not yet been able to accumulate the needed supplies for that journey. With William's encouragement, they began their westward movement by traveling with him to Iowa City, the jumping off spot for the immigrant trains. William had been asked to help with the outfitting of the trains as the groups came in and Lorin and Lovina stayed with him and helped in that work. Lorin was good at working with wood and was soon busy helping to make a new device that the Church was experimenting with – the handcart.

Through the early summer they worked to get several trains on their way. The travel season was about spent and the crews were getting ready to close down the camp when the Willie Company arrived having been delayed by transportation. They also reported that another group, the Martin Company, was behind them and they all wanted to get to the valley that fall. Everyone went to work and did their best to get these people ready for making the trip so late in the season.

By the time all the companies were on the trail and the camp was cleaned up ready for the next year's efforts, it was too late for them to go across the plains, so they went as far as Florence, Nebraska and spent the winter there.

In the spring, Lorin's brother, William, headed west, but Lorin's skills were needed in Florence and he was prevailed upon to stay there for a while.

It was in the fall of 1859 when they had an unexpected visitor, Lovina's brother, John, arrived in Florence having traveled from the Valley. John's plans were to go on east as far as Nauvoo, visit with Emma and other family members and then head west in the spring, hopefully with Lorin and Lovina with him.

So it was that in the spring of 1860, Lorin and Lovina with their six children crossed the plains in the John Smith Company, arriving in the Valley the 1st of September.

They settled in Farmington where they lived for the next several years.

In October 1876, Lovina was expecting her 13th child, but things were not going well. On Sunday morning, October 8, the child was delivered, but Lovina gradually slipped away and died that afternoon. She was buried in Farmington, but her remains were later moved to the Smith family plot in Salt Lake City.

On January 3 our speaker was Elder Jörg Klebingat of the First Quorum of the Seventy. Elder Jörg Klebingat was sustained as a General Authority Seventy of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on April 5, 2014. At the time of his call he was serving as president of the Ukraine Kyiv Mission. He served as a member of the Europe East Area Presidency

from August 2014 to August 2016. He is currently serving at Church headquarters as an Assistant Executive Director in the Temple Department and as an Area Assistant in the North America Southeast Area.

Elder Klebingat received both a Bachelor of Arts degree in Russian and a master's degree in organizational behavior from Brigham Young University, and he began his career working for several consulting companies. Prior to his call as mission president, he worked for many years with the Church in positions such as Kyiv Ukraine service center manager, Europe East Area director for temporal affairs, and Europe Area distribution supervisor.

Since joining the Church in 1985, Elder Klebingat has served in numerous Church callings, including a full-time missionary in the Colorado Denver Mission, Young Men president, elders quorum president, high councilor, bishop, and mission president.

Jörg Klebingat was born in Zweibrücken, Germany, on December 19, 1967. He married Julia Poltorak in August 1991. They are the parents of three children.

From these additional sources it was shown that Joseph's bid for the Presidency of the United States was so strong that individuals from outside of the

state of Illinois were sent in to participate in the assault on Joseph. From the information Dr. Dunn presented it seems that political assassination as well as religious persecution contributed to the


### HURRICANE VALLEY CHAPTER - Hurricane, Utah

### JORDAN RIVER TEMPLE CHAPTER - South Jordan, Utah

Our program for January was speaker, Quentin T. Wells, great-grandson of Daniel H. Wells. Daniel Wells has a special history of activity in the settling of the Salt Lake City area during the early days in pioneer history.

Daniel Wells lived in Nauvoo when the saints came there from Missouri seeking a peaceful place to settle. Daniel was friendly and a sympathetic non-member of the Church. He eventually was baptized in 1846 and joined the pioneers being one of the last members to leave Nauvoo.

In 1857, he was called to be Second Counselor to President Brigham Young. He served as a counselor for twenty years.

Daniel Wells was elected mayor of Salt Lake City in 1866 where he served for ten years. At one time, he served as the Public Works Director in Salt Lake City. In that position, he was responsible for the building of many early buildings in the city.

Daniel Wells is also known as a military leader in both Nauvoo and Utah. He led the territorial militia in four Indian conflicts and a confrontation with the U.S. Army in the Utah War. He ran businesses in lumbering, coal, mining, manufacturing, and gas production. He also developed roads, ferries, and railroads. He had a family of seven wives, which included thirty-seven children.

Quentin T. Wells recently finished a book on the life of Daniel H. Wells. It is titled *Defender, The Life of Daniel H. Wells.* Thank you Quentin for this most interesting presentation. And thank you for bringing your wife, Pat, on this occasion.

### LEHI CHAPTER - Lehi, Utah

On January 9th we had our installation, dinner, and a presentation by **David Ogden** on the southern expedition headed by Parley P. Pratt. Our new officers and board members were sworn in by Dan Adams, the area VP for the Sons of Utah Pioneers. We had a nice ham dinner and then the presentation.

Dave told us interesting things about Parley P. Pratt and his group that went south from Salt Lake City, under the direction of President Brigham Young, to determine what areas would be habitable for future settlement of some of the 70,000 people that were in the Salt Lake Valley. The party travelled from Salt Lake City south across the rim of the Great Basin to the Virgin River near future St. George.

Pratt's party of fifty set out in the winter of 1849-50. They followed the Spanish Trail and other existing paths but also found new routes. As they went, they noted possible town

sites, agricultural and mineral potential, water supplies, and other resources, creating an often-followed blueprint for the Mormon push south.

Their descriptions of the Utes and Paiutes, including leaders Walkara and Arapeen, are among the most valuable parts of the journals. The Indians welcomed the travelers but were suffering from disease, increasing white settlement and travel in their territories, and trade in Indian slaves. Such encounters helped shape future relations with the tribes. Made in the depth of winter, the arduous journey included many hardships and adventures but had a permanent impact on Utah history.

### MAPLE MOUNTAIN CHAPTER - Mapleton / Spanish Fork, Utah

We were excited to have a famous native Mapleton scientist speak to us in our January chapter dinner meeting. **David Allan** is the world-wide expert on global time, a topic most of us know very little about. Because of his brilliant pioneering research abilities that evolved from his master's thesis at the University of Colorado, he helped develop the atomic-clock timekeeping system for the US and the world. Atomic clocks are the most accurate time pieces in the world. Their accuracy is "much better than a billioneth of a second in a day. The benefits of high precision timing are way beyond most anyone's comprehension. If you did away with precision timing, you would be back in the dark ages."

After receiving his Master's Degree in physics at the University of Colorado in 1965, he joined now-named "National Institute of Standards and Technology" at Boulder, Colorado where he pioneered in developing precision time. He has received numerous awards world-wide for the work he has done to improve the atomic clock.

Unique in his contribution to time is his background in the Church and his search for the meaning and purpose of our time on planet Earth and its relationship to eternity. His mottos are "Truth is Light and Light is Love". He previously worked at the Harold B. Library as a Subject Librarian for Religion and Ancient Scripture. He attended BYU to study History and Biblical Hebrew at the University of North Carolina--Greensboro for a Masters in Library Science. He and his wife Elizabeth live in Provo with their three children and another baby on the way in February.

After his presentation I used it to look for the missionary who baptized an ancestor in 1842 hoping to locate where my ancestor was living at the time. I did not find what I was specifically looking for, but did find much information that will help to complete the picture. A sister in our ward is working on this project and she told me they are reconciling this database with the FamilyTree in FamilySearch. The first time I looked for the missionary I found 3 references, a week later there were ten, showing they are very actively working on this project.

### SETTLEMENT CANYON - Tooele, Utah

On Thursday Jan 5th, Robert Hansen told a fascinating piece of LDS immigration history that very few know about. and has been largely lost, even by those who are descendants of those immigrants

involved. After the LDS Church was established in Utah the Perpetual Immigration Fund was established to help especially European converts to join the body of the saints in Utah. Through this fund, money was loaned to those who couldn't pay their own way to travel to the headquarters of the church. As those converts became established here in Zion, they then were expected to pay back those loans so that others could take advantage of this program.

The well-known handcart program was a part of this effort and except for the fateful year of 1856 was very successful. Starting in 1860, the church experimented with a new way of helping people travel. In these years, Utah found itself dollar poor but oxen rich. Brigham Young's answer to this problem was to send Ox teams from Utah to where the Transcontinental Railroad ended at the Missouri River. Converted European saints would then make the final 1000-mile trek to Utah with these oxen teams that carried their belongings as well as the necessary food stuffs to complete their journey.

Some of Robert Hansen's ancestors were part of these "Down and Back Wagon Trains." Unluckily, these very ancestors ended up on what unpopularly became known as the "Abner Lowery Cholera Train." Of the 201 Danes who left by ship in 1866 to travel to Utah, 101 died of cholera along the way. It is suspected that this water-born intestinal bacteria that, untreated, eventually meant death, was contracted from contaminated water supplies on the ocean voyage from Denmark to New York. From New York, various routes by rail and steamship brought them to a new steamship landing on the Missouri River about 40 miles from Florence, Nebraska. The bacteria that had taken hold while sailing over the Atlantic Ocean, incubated and finally manifested itself at various locations along the route from Denmark to Salt Lake City, usually ending in burial

in whatever caskets from sheets to odd lumber that could be cobbled together. In order to keep wolves from getting at these remains, a smudge of burned buffalo chips were scattered over the burial plots.

Because of the alcohol and sexual immorality at the already established jump off landings at the end of the railroad, as well as shortage of supplies caused by the Civil War still raging, Brigham Young sent church agents to establish its own jump off point and procure their own supplies. This jumping off point was named Wyoming, Nebraska. The coordination from church headquarters of oxen teams, wagons, food and other supplies sent from Utah and purchased in Nebraska and other places that needed to be on hand when these converts arrived at Wyoming, Nebraska is breathtaking in scope, especially considering that the only communication at that time was by telegraph.

In one line of Hansen's ancestry, a family consisting of husband, wife and 5 children, became a husband and one son by the time they arrived in Utah. In other situations, entire families were claimed by the dreaded cholera which is easily taken care of by antibiotics today. In quite an irony, the one surviving son of this particular Hansen family was called back to Scandinavia as a missionary, leaving wife and children behind. After serving his mission he returned to Utah 16 years after being that only child in his family to survive the original Trek. On the return from his mission, in a party of 541 travelers, he arrived back home without a single death in the group. What a difference 16 years can make.






